SENDIASS

One of the links on the final page of each newsletter I have sent has been a link to SENDIASS, the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Information Advice and Support Service. Many of you will know about, or had contact with SENDIASS, however, there may be some of you who are unfamiliar with it so I thought I would give you a bit more information about the service. They offer their services to parents of children both with and without a diagnosis and cover all areas of SEND.

The main support they offer for parents includes:

- Support parents/carers of children who have or may have special educational needs.
- Support children and young people who have or may have special educational needs.
- Recognise the importance of parents, carers, young people and children's views.
- Help the Local Authority and parent/carers and schools work together to meet the needs of children and young people.
- Offer free impartial advice.
